

VIRTUAL STAKEHOLDER CONSULTATION



As the Adopt A River Programme embarked on a new year, the Implementation Unit gained renewed vigor and commitment to continue the mandate of the Programme. Our focus on integrated water resources management requires the involvement of all community stakeholders to ensure a holistic approach to issues affecting our watersheds, which includes improved water quality and water supply security, through viable and sustainable watershed projects, and environmental activities. As such, one of the key components of the Programme is public awareness and engagement.

With this in mind, the Unit sought to

engage new stakeholders and reengage established partners. This led to the planning and hosting of the Unit's first virtual stakeholder consultation on Tuesday March 28th, 2023.

This engagement focused on the northern region of the country, with the aim of subsequent consultations to focus on other areas within Trinidad and Tobago. Through notable presentations by a number of invited speakers, participants were introduced to the scope of work of the Adopt a River Programme and that of other agencies with responsibility for water and environmental management. These agencies included representatives from the Water and Sewerage Authority

(WASA) Operations North East and North West, the Water Resources Agency(WRA), Ministry of Agriculture, Lands and Fisheries, Ministry of Works, Drainage Division and the Office of Disaster Preparedness and Management (ODPM).

Interest was sparked as the platform created a space for raising issues affecting the current state of our rivers, water quality and water supply by both presenters and participants alike. Further, individuals were encouraged to not only take action but develop an attitude of responsibility, to better manage our watersheds and preserve and conserve our water supply and natural resources.

ENGAGING THE CITIZENS OF T&T

Engaging citizens through public outreach and educational awareness exercises is a key component of the Adopt A River Programme. We continue to highlight issues affecting our rivers and watersheds, and the action needed to improve the state of our rivers in various communities throughout Trinidad and Tobago. In the last quarter, our team conducted outreaches at different locations including schools, scouts and supermarkets. and in collaboration with various groups.

At Clarke Rochard Government Primary School, over 200 students from standards 1-4 were engaged in our educational exercises, as well as the Jamaat Al Muslimeen Primary School, where over 30 students from standards 2 and 3 were engaged through a presentation which informed students and teachers about the goals of the AARP, the significance of our watersheds, water conservation, and environmental responsibility. Similar exercises were conducted at the 2nd Fullerton Scouts in Cedros.



TRAINING WATER WARRIORS IN **TOBAGO**



The CReW+ Project, in collaboration with the Environmental Research Institute Charlotteville (ERIC), and the recently formed Charlotteville Water Warriors (CWW), will work towards ensuring that residents are provided with educational, technical and infrastructural resources to improve the capabilities of handling water and wastewater associated with their properties, as well as tools to mitigate the effects of climate change within their community.

Our water warrior training encompasses both awareness and education on topics such as: pollution and its causes, the importance of water and its relation to the environment; watershed management; and water quality sampling and testing. As such, the Adopt A River Programme (AARP) has partnered with ERIC to work towards the development of the project's public engagement tool. AARP conducted a training session with content that was tailored to meet the needs of the CWW and by extension the CReW+ project. Participants were exposed to presentations covering Water Facts, Watershed Management, Wastewater, and a field exercise on water quality testing.







"KNOW YOUR WATERSHED" **BUS TOURS - Part 1**

This year, in commemoration of World Water Day celebrated by the United Nations (UN) on March 22nd annually, the Programme decided to do something a little bit different by hosting a series of bus tours through various parts of Trinidad and Tobago. These tours were designed to introduce the general public to various watersheds and highlight the negative and positive effects on our watersheds as a result of human activities.

A series of four (4) free tours covering different locations was proposed and launched on our social media (Facebook and Instagram) platforms,

with access link to our website for registration. Within 72 hours of launch, all tours were fully booked and participants were rearing to go.

We kicked off with our first tour on Saturday, April 1 st in South Trinidad which took us through the Moruga and South Oropouche Watersheds, with interest points which included Columbus Bay, Moruga Spring Bridge, Diggity Mud Volcano and Tulsa Trace Picnic Site.

Our second tour took us to East Trinidad, through the Tacarigua, Santa Cruz and Maracas Watersheds where we visited the St Michael's Agro Forestry Facility, Bourg Mulatresse River, St Joseph River and Morang where participants were invited to take a dip in the cool waters after a scorching day on the road.

This forum provided us with the opportunity to not only expose our participants to some of the sixty-nine watersheds within our twin island republic, but also to highlight and show firsthand some of the issues, and raise awareness for actionable solutions by encouraging participation and responsibility in preserving and maintaining our watersheds.


